Shingles & the Shingrix Vaccine

What you need to know



What is shingles?

Shingles is a painful rash of blister-like sores on one side of the face or body. You might also have a fever, headache, chills, or an upset stomach.

What causes shingles?

Shingles is caused by the same virus as chickenpox. So if you had chickenpox as a child, this virus might become activated again when you are older to become shingles.

\rightarrow Is there a shingles vaccine?

Yes! Shingrix is a vaccine that gives strong protection against shingles and the pain you might feel in your skin where you had shingles (called postherpetic neuralgia). The vaccine is given in 2 doses, 2 - 6 months apart.

Who should get Shingrix?

- Adults age 50 and older
- Adults age 19 and older who have weakened immune systems

→ These groups should get Shingrix even if they:

- Had shingles in the past
- Got the Zostavax vaccine (for shingles)
- Got the varicella vaccine (for chickenpox)

Where can I get Shingrix?

Ask your doctor or local pharmacist

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What will I feel if I get the vaccine?

After getting the vaccine, you might feel:

- Soreness, redness, or swelling where you got the vaccine
- Very tired
- Muscle pain or headache
- Fever or chills
- Stomach pain or nausea
